14. M^r Edmund Brown bought of Hugh Drury three acres of upland lying
near to timber works being part of a flat of ground with part of a
well of land to the town formerly granted to Hugh Drury and joined to the
land of the said Edmund Brown.

M^r Edmund Brown bought of Henry Prentice five acres of upland
lying upon a parcel of land between the maddons and the maddons being
the maddons division of upland granted to Henry Prentice, only of most
westerly of all the lots upon that part of land only of between the
land of the said Edmund Brown and the maddons and the maddons
and the maddons. And also one acre of upland lying upon a
flat of land that joined to timber works, it is part of a parcel
of land with the town granted to Henry Prentice, with a part of land

Granted to M^r Edmund Brown ten acres of maddons four of it for
satisfaction for the highway going through his maddons at the bridge
the other six acres for a road to the third division of maddons and
it lies between the maddons of Bryan Pondston and John Mearns
and runs from upland to upland crossing westbrooke of the town end
of the maddons brook.

Laid out to M^r Edmund Brown being formerly granted him for his
third division of upland of maddons fifty five acres of upland and
twenty five acres of maddons lying in the southernmost part of the bounds
of Sudbury of upland of maddons joined together toward the west side
of the upland, the upland is parted from the maddons commonly called
the westmaddons by the highway and from the maddons southward
a little gutter of maddons in it next to the east side of it. And westward
joined to the said twenty five acres of maddons only four acres of
the said upland lies joining to the north part of the maddons
