bride point w^{ch} he accepted in satisfaction for the said want of
measure, w^{ch} twenty arres of upland lyeth adjoininge to the south
side of his third division of upland & meadows, And is marked
at the head of the brooke by the highway on the East side upon
a great white oak & thence runneth westward to another white oak
marked southward from the corner of the broad peere of meadows
layd out by Edmund Goodenow & Chuge Griffyn.

Also granted and layd out to m^r Edmund Brown in the year 1649
one hundred and thirty arres of land be it more or lesse in the two miles
last granted the town of Culbury, w^{ch} he sayd one hundred and thirty
arres was the twentieth lot and lye in the second and north east square
and ioyneth to the lands of John Lokers given on the south and the lands
of Doreen of more over out of north and butchery on the highway north
wards wide and the five miles first granted the town of Culbury
on the east and butchery on the west as upon the mill of Culbury
and lying square
