Granted By the towne (and layd out by Joseph nays John Goodenough and
Zarniah maniond who were appointed by the towne for that worke that soe it
may bee by them returned to the reade and by him recorded in the towne
booke of records which is as followeth Seventen acres and five score rods
of the towne Grant. Next five acres and six score rods lying on the north
side of the furthest string of pine meadow beginning at his owne meadow first
marked with a white oake and runne a straight line
fifty rods near a northern point to a stake marked for the angle and then
run another line to the side of the swamp and then the angle and runne
is bounded with a maple by the side of the swamp and is marked with
on a southern line and shutt home to his owne meadow and is marked with
a white maple at the lower end of the swamp by his owne meadow
and then turne another angle and shutt home to his owne meadow and is
marked with a white maple at the lower end of the swamp by his owne meadow
out on the south side of the furthest or northernmost string of pine meadow
beginning at his owne meadow from his owne meadow and runne a straight line
marked 6 or seven rods and shutt home to his owne corner of his
southerly forty and eight rods and shutt home to his owne corner of his
meadow at the north side of the first string of pine meadow then turne
the corner and runne forty and two rods on an easterly line and runne
and joyne to his owne meadow and then turne another angle
12 rods and joyne to his owne meadow and then turne another angle
and runne forty and eight rods by his owne meadow and joyne the same till
it come to the stake where it first began and thence it proceed
lower acre and twenty rods laid out on the south side of the southernmost
string of pine meadow beginning at a swampy white oake where is the
bound betwixt Robert man and the said John Haines beginning thence
at nothing runne fifty rods on a straight line to a point two eastward of
south and turne the angle and runne a straight line easterly to a maple
tree in his owne meadow this land is joyning to his owne meadow from
this maple untill it come home to the swamp oake marked betwixt him
the said John Haines and Robert man the before mentioned Seventen
acres of land and five score rods laid out in the severall places and
bounded by the men before mentioned who were appointed by
the towne of Sudbury this said land be it howsoever is to bee and
remaine the said John Haines his heirs Executors assigns and assigns

for ever
In. Lud where of the said John Haines hath laid down and surrendered
up to the towne Seventen acres and five score rods of land on the
north side of Lake end hill which Seventen acres of land is to bee
and five score rods of land is to bee at the towne of Sudbury forever
