

Ridge meadowe. The upland ioynd to the outfild of the butchery of
the first two millis granted to the Towne. The Eastend of it is bound
by the west brooke. And the west end rund from the butchery Northeast
till it comes to a red oake about thirty yrd from the upper end of the meadowe.
And then shedes up about thirty yrd Northwest to a string of small oaks
being marked for the town brook. And from thence rund Northeast to a white oake
marked. And from thence over the little brooke that rund into the head
of the meadowe to a red oake marked about the rock. And so upon a
string of lynes to a white oake that answereth to the string of lynes of the
meadowe on the Northeast side of the meadowe. We said upland doth
ioynd to the meadowe to the South west & Northwest parts of it. And
the fourteen acres of meadowe extendeth it selfe from the upland in the
upper end of it. All the whole pece of meadowe till it comes to the
meadowe of John Wood (we was granted to him for his allowance to
his third division of meadowe) And the six acres of meadowe lying
in Ridge meadowe ioynd all alonge to the meadowe of William Wards
and parted from his meadowe by an oake on the west side the meadowe
and from the oake extendeth to a ymd on the hill side. And at the Eastend
parted by a marked ymd from William Wards meadowe. extendeth in
breadth to a small young oake upon a little fild of upland. We said
upland & meadowe bee they more or lesse were layd out by the apointment
of the Towne by Edmund Goddenore & Hugh Crispe forty acres of the
said upland was granted by the Towne to Thomas Whistler. And also
the twenty acres of meadowe was granted to the said Thomas Whistler
for in consideration of ten acres of meadowe. We was formerly granted
to him at the ashen swamp. We ten acres he hath resigned up against
unto the Towne. Six acres more of the foresaid upland was the third
division of upland belonging to William Parker & is parte of the
lande that William Whornd bought of him. And the other one & therty
acres of upland was the third division of upland granted to Thomas
Whornd.

Also granted and layd out unto Mr William Brown in the year
1659 his farm of two hundred acres of land and his
cult of proportion of land in the two millis last granted
by the Towne of Sudbury being one hundred and forty acres
more. Said three hundred and thirty acres of layd by in
the fild and narrow square in the north west angle
bounded by the river and highway to the second bound on the
north end to the river on the west and the part of
the new grant lot of John Audbuck on the south and
highway to the miller & away on the east by a fild
said farm of two hundred acres was granted him by
the Count.
