

May 1st 1748. Then laid out to Mr Joseph Willis one Acre & Eighty
Two Rods of Upland and meadow Lying in Sudbury in the
East Thirty Rod Wide Way - Bound as follows Beginning
at a Small pine the North Westerly corner of Land formerly
laid out, to Mr Peter Noyes and Runs Easterly on said Mr Noyes
Land & meadow twenty Rod and three Quarters to a Stake in
the Old Town line - Then Northerly on an old line (which
Parts Mr Noyes Meadow from the Premises) Ten Rods & half to
a Stake, then Westerly Twenty Six Rods of Land & Meadows
formerly laid out to Mr Willis to a Stake and heap of Stones then
Runs Southerly Ten Rods & half, on a Town Way Leading from
Balsoms to the Meeting House - All which may more
fully appear by the above plan. *pro Stephen Hammer Surveyor*

May 1st 1748. Then laid out to Mr Joseph Willis Three Acres and
one Hundred & thirty three Rods of Upland Lying in Sudbury
in the East thirty Rod wide way - Bound as follows begin
ing at a Heap of Stones, on the Northerly side of Lancaster
Road, in the old Town line & Runs Northerly on said old Line
Sixty Six Rods, to a Oak Tree marked, then Runs Westerly
thirteen Rods & half on Land of said Joseph Willis to a Stake
and heap of Stones; then Runs Southerly fifty Eight Rods and
half on Land of Josiah Willis; to a heap of Stones by said
Lancaster Road, then on said Road Eight Rods & three Quarters
to the first Bound all which may appear by the above Plan

May 1st 1756. Then laid out to Mr Joseph Willis Seven Acres
and one Hundred & twenty Six Rods of Upland & meadow Lying
in Sudbury, in the Easterly Thirty Rod Wide Way: on the
Southerly side of Lancaster Road as now trod, having one Acre
and Seventy Rod of Upland entirely within the same formerly
laid out to Deacon Clay, now owned by said Joseph Willis said
Seven Acres & Bound as follows Beginning at a large Black Oak
Tree marked for Lancaster Road: And Runs Southerly on the
second Tier of Lotts (being said Joseph Willis Land) thirty two
Rod to an heap of Stones, then Runs South Easterly thirty Rods
on Land formerly laid out to Samuel Brigham to a Wall met
Tree - Then Runs Northerly forty Rods on the Old Town to a
heap of Stones, then Northwesterly thirty Nine Rods on
Lancaster Road to the Black Oak first mentioned all which
may
