

his household and for the addition of upland adjoining together containing by estimation eight acres or there about be the same more or less lying in the salt brooks between the lande of John Stone & John Reddick.

Allso a parcell of meadows containing by estimation one acre or there about be the same more or less lying between Nathaniell Creadway and John Reddick in the great river meadows.

Allso a parcell of meadows containing by estimation three acres or there about be the same more or less lying in the Great river meadows between John Woodnors and Robert Darvill.

1645 Granted to Henry Curtis ten acres of upland lying on the south side of Millbrook adjoining to the brook, parted by the brook from the land of John Cutler, the south side lying to the highway leading on to the pine plains.

1646 Granted to Henry Curtis two acres of meadow lying in the great river meadows on the west side of the river between the meadow of Thomas Boyes & Hugh Griffin.

Allso granted and layd out to Henry Curtis in the year 1648 one hundred and twenty acres of land in the two miles last granted the town of Sudbury being the first lot and lying in the first square corner lying the lands of Joseph Freeman on the south and the lands of James Goodall on the north butting on the east on the highway adjoining to the five miles first granted the town of Sudbury and butting on the west upon the middle highway and fourth and fourth west square corner.

Then given & granted by the Town unto Joseph Curtis of the
Estate of Assignors for the said town the said quarter of
an acre of Land situated lying & being within the said Town on the
north side of the road of alloted land between the road of the way
of the road to David Allen's adjoining to a parcell of his own land
the said formerly bought of John Reddick the said 19 acres & the
quarter of an acre was by the Town surveyed & measured out to
him as follows: the line begins at the south east corner of the said
land abutting & from the said line easterly along the side of the said
way to a red oak tree & stands on the north side of a gravelly bank
knowle, & from the said line still easterly to a stable standing on the
western side of Egmont Brown's meadow between the said line fifty
four rods: & from the said stable the line runs northerly to a
young Asp on the top of the meadow all along Egmont Brown's meadow
& from the said Asp the line runs northerly to a small weild oak
marked & stands on the north east side of a small brook & contains
the said rods: & from the said weild oak the line runs westerly to a small
black oak tree marked standing upon a gravelly bank knowle, & from
