Granted to John Lokar ten axers of upland be the said more or lesse, lyinge in
the butt part of the house bounde, & lyeth between the hige way leadinge from water-
house to the Dunstons stannoe & joynt to the east side of the lande of Henry
Lokar.
Granted to John Lokar 2 axers of meadow lyinge in the lower pt of the park
meadowe between the meadowe of John Toll with Kerdy son.

Granted and layd out to the widow Lokar in the years 1628 one hundred
and thirty axers of land in the two millers last granted the town of Gilling
the said one hundred and thirty axers of land beinge the minkes lot and
lyeth in the forond and north east square havinge the lands of Gilling
whall on the south and the lands of Mr Edmund Brown the pastor on the
north beinge bounded at the east end with a gige way runninge to the
first miles first granted the town of Sudbury and bounded at
the west end with the middle gige way runninge to the third square
of lots

Said out by ord. of the Town (by Capt. Edm. Goodnow, Deacon John Staines
Ed Town Surveyor) unto Mary Lokar widow & her lict of John Lokar also de-
ceased & her lict of upland situate lyinge & beinge on the west side
of the Great River of Sudbury beinge part of a parcel of land called Walnut
tree Gill (w^{ch} had bought of Robert Lokar to whom it was granted and
stands recorded on his booke folio 35.) w^{ch} & the said lands (beinge now in
her possession) lye & are on the south east side of Walnut tree Gill, bounded
on the north west by the barway y^e leads to Panty Bridge havinge a young
white oak tree marked, standinge by the pale side, at the south corner: and at
the east end corner, there is a two small white oak tree growinge out of
the root, marked; & from the said tree some north westerly to an oak
tree marked up the side of the Gill; & from the said tree some southerly to a
young oak tree marked, standinge on the brow of the Gill; & from the said tree
some to the south corner by the Pale where it began
