

We, the Subscribers, being Appointed a Committee by the Town of Sudbury, to see, if they could Agree, with the Proprietors, of the River Meadow: Relating to a High-
way, lately laid out, by the Selectmen, of Sudbury, on
Haynes Island, so called.

Came into the following Agreement, Viz^t. That the sd
Way, beginning at Round Rocks between Sudbury
and Concord, And running Westward, to a small white-
Oak, marked on a Ditch, bank: in the Town, and
following the Town to another white Oak Tree, mark-
ed, on a Ditch Bank: - So following the Ditch,
to a Maple Tree, marked: - And so on, to a Grey-
Oak, marked: near Mr. Probin's fence: - From
thence to a white Oak, stand: on a knoll, against
William Parkman's Meadow, & from thence to
a Stake and Stones, against Mr. Dahms's Mea-
dow, thence to a Stake & Stones, being Mr.
Probin's corner, by Ware Meadow.

¶ This Highway, is to be Three Rods wide,
from end to end: - at least, from the Meadow.

¶ The Marks, are all on the Westward side of sd
way. - The last mentioned Round, is the place
where the Selectmen, ended their way, in May 1788.
which way, lead to little gulph Causey.

Furthermore, we the Committee, for the Town of
Sudbury, and Mr. William Parkman, who appeared in Be-
half of the Proprietors, of the River Meadow, came into the
following Agreement: - That the Town of Sudbury, shall
be at no Cost, or Charge, for making or mending sd
way: for the future: - Provided they, are never Rated, to the
Highway Rate, for the Above said Meadow Lot.
