and Thomas ^{never} the day and year last above written six acres of upland be it more or
less upon the prime hill above the now dwelling house of John Rutter and also
about the dwelling house of the sayd Thomas Stourds being bounded on the west
by the highway and on the north by the brow of the sayd prime hill as also bounded
on the south by the lands of John Rutter and the sayd Thomas Stourds and
the lands of John Smith as also bounded on the east side by the Common
lands of Sudbury this sayd six acres of land was granted m^r Thomas
Stourds in lieu of six acres at land he layd down to the Town of
Sudbury also which sayd six acres layd down to the Town of Sudbury
was first granted m^r Stourds for his house lot and by the highway
of the highway of forget fiddlers being bounded on the north by a highway
way leading from the Town of Sudbury to the house of forget fiddlers
