

Upon the Request and ^{at} Desire of Timothy Gibson of Sudbury: pursuant to a Grant made by the town of Sudbury to him in full satisfaction to him for Land Taken from him for two high ways through his Land Called New Grant Land one leading from Stow towards Concord and the other leading over Elsbeth River towards Sudbury: by Select men of the town have laid out to him the to Timothy Gibson his heirs and assigns for Ever: Two acres and one hundred and twenty Rods of Land lying and being in the second or westerly Thirty Rods high way in said Sudbury Bounded westerly by the Gibsons Land Called New Grant Land: Northerly Bounded by Land Granted by the town to Thomas Burk: and otherways Bounded by the 30 Rods high way: marked Trees stakes and stones: and is further Bounded as may appear by the plat there of Surveyed by John Hayns
Sudbury: July: 6: 1728:

at a meeting of the town of Sudbury Legally warned to town by a note did Concord with and Except of the above to Surveyed and Return and ordered their town Clerk to Record the same in their town Book
Sudbury: March: 3: 1728: 9:

Now the subscribers Select men of the town of Sudbury being a Committee Chosen and appointed and Impowered by the town for to make satisfaction to the persons that have had high ways laid out through their lands lying in the New Grants out of the Thirty Rods high way: the subscribers present Select men of the town: have Granted: and laid out unto Deacon John Clap of Sudbury: and to his heirs and assigns for Ever: in full satisfaction: for a high way: leading from Court Richard Taylors: &c. To the meeting house in the west precinct in Sudbury: and from time since by the Select men of Sudbury through his Land Called New Grant Land: viz: one acre and fifty Rods of Land lying and being in Sudbury: and on the westerly side of the Sudbury River: and in the Easterly Thirty Rods highway in and joining to a Gutter now to and Easterly from the Deacon Claps New Grant Land: and is Every ways Bounded by the New Grant high way Land and is further Bounded as may appear by the plat of the same as it was Surveyed and laid out by
