

November, Anno Domini 1791.

Then Voted, that so far as the sum of £500, be secured to the Town by the Sale of the Pew, then to proceed to the building said House: in such way, as the Town may think proper. — then voted, to choose the Selectmen, a Committee, for carrying the aforesaid Vote, into prosecution, so far as relate, to the Sale of the Pew. — Then Voted, that the New Meeting House, to be erected, be sixty feet, long, & forty-eight feet, wide. — then Voted, that there be a Tower built at one end, of the Meeting House, for the purpose of hanging a Bell. & also voted, to have a porch, at the other end, of said House. — then Voted to choose a Committee for the purpose of draughting a plan, of said House, completely finished, — and the former Committee viz^t Mr Jones, Mr Tower, & Mr Thompson were rechosen. said Committee to Report, a future time. —

then Voted, to excuse Mr Thompson, from serving on said Committee, & chose Mr Doane, in his stead. then Voted, that the Pew, when sold, be considered as ready built, to the purchaser.

Then Voted, to Adjourn this Meeting, to the first Monday, in January, next, at 1 o'clock Afternoon to meet at this place.

Saturday January 2^d 1792, The Town being Met, agreeable to the foregoing Adjournment, proceeded, — and then Voted, to take up a New Warrant accepted by the Town, agreeable to the petition of Henry Smith & others, for annexing themselves and Estate, to the Town of Stow: — This Meeting was taken up, in consequence of the Town's Vote, for adjourning the former Meeting, for one Quarter of an Hour.

Sunday Monday 2^d January 1792. At a legal Town Meeting, held in Sudbury, on the Day & Year aforesaid, presided & chose Col^l Thos Moderator, ²⁷ then the Town attended, to the Reason, & Observation of the Petitioners in their behalf. — & the Question being put, to see, if the Town, would set off, the said Petitioners agreeable to their Petition, and it pass'd, in the Negative. Then Voted to Dissolve this Meeting.
