- = It was again Moved & Seconded, to see if the Town would accept the report of their School Committee as Exhibited by them, — which being put to Vote, it again passed in the Negative —
- = The Question was then asked to see if the Town would Dismiss their School-Committee which were appointed in March Last, & it passed in the Negative — Then the Town by their Vote, put by the further Consideration of this Article to May Meeting —

3^d = There was Not any Office, appeared to be Vacant —

4th It was Voted that any person belonging to said Town who shall kill any Crows, shall be Entitled to receive for every old one, one Shilling & six pence, & for every young one, Nine pence wth Head, with in one year from the Date — also Voted that any person who shall kill said Crows, shall Not be entitled to receive said Bounty Except they were killed within the Limits of said Town, — also Voted, that those persons who shall kill said Crows shall bring them in to the Selectmen of said Town, & receive a Certificate of the Number, in Order for an allowance there for —

5th Voted, to appoint a Committee of five Persons, for the purpose of Crailing this Towns proportion of the Long Causeway, & setting out a sufficient Number of Willow trees to answer the purpose for Guides in the time of a Flood, Committee appointed, were the five Selectmen, — also Voted, that it be Left Discretionary, with the Selectmen, to get it done in that way, which shall appear to be Most for the Interest of the Town, —

6th Voted, Not to do Nor act any thing upon this Article

7th Article Referred, to May Meeting for further Consideration —

= Attended to the report of their Committee, who were appointed, to Disent a suitable Spot of ground, whercon to erect a School-House in the South-west District in said Town, — which report was, that they had staked out a spot of ground, whercon to erect said house upon about fifty or Sixty Rods South of the present School-House in a Gore of Land, (Near Mr. Duttons field) said Land being owned by Mr. John Fairbank, — The Question was then put to see, if the Town, would accept of the above report & it —
