In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Sudbury qualified to Vote in Elections and town affairs to meet at the Meeting house of the first Parish in said town on Monday the twenty third day of December current at one O'clock in the afternoon precisely to bring in to the Selectmen their written votes for a Representative of this Commonwealth in the Congress of the United States for District Number Four.

Polls to be opened at precisely two O'clock P.M.

And further to act on the following articles viz.

- 1st To Choose a Moderator
- 2^d To hear and act on all Reports that may be offered
- 3^d - To see if the town will build a Town House, or provide a place for holding their Meetings to do or act as they shall think best.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up an attested copy thereof at each Public Meeting house in said town two Sabbaths at least before the time of holding said Meeting

Hereof fail not and make return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at or before the time of Meeting aforesaid.
