In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are required to Notify the Inhabitants of the town of Sudbury Qualified to vote for Representatives to the General Court of this Commonwealth to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday the twenty six day of May current it being the fourth Monday of said month at one of the clock in the afternoon precisely to bring in to the Selectmen their votes for one Representative to Represent them in the Congress of the United States of America for the term of two years from the fourth day of March 1851. for District No. four.

Polls to be opened at half past one o'clock P.M.

And you are furthermore required to notify the Inhabitants of said Sudbury Qualified to vote in town affairs to meet at the above named time and place there and there to act on the following articles viz.

Art. 1st To Choose a Moderator

Art. 2^d To see if the town will build a Wall at the Road near Mineaway Brook in place of Railing, to do or act as the town may think best.

Art. 3^d To see if the town will take measures to purchase a new Burrill cloth to do or act as the town shall think proper.

Art. 4th To Hear and act on all Reports.

Art. 5th To see if the town will discount any Taxes that may be offered for that purpose.

Art. 6th To see what action the town will take in reference to a claim of George W. Stone for damages received in consequence of an alledged defect in the High way to do or act on said subject as the town may think best.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up an attested copy thereof at the Townhouse and at each of the Public Meeting houses in said town two Sabbath at least before the time set for holding said meeting.
