In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts You are
required to notify the Inhabitants of the town of Dudbury Qualified
to Vote in Elections to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday
the fourteenth day of November current it being the second Monday of
said month at nine of the clock in the forenoon precisely to bring in to
the Selectmen their votes for a Governor and Lieut. Governor of this
Commonwealth, and six Senators for the District of Middlesex all on
one ballot.

Also to bring in their votes upon the following propositions
Submitted by the Constitutional Convention held on the first Wednesday
of May 1853 viz.

- 1st Shall proposition number One containing the Preamble Declaration
of Rights and Form of Government. Stand as the Constitution of the
Commonwealth of Massachusetts?
- 2^d Shall proposition number Two respecting the Habeas Corpus, stand as a
part of the Constitution?
- 3^d Shall proposition number Three respecting the Rights of Jurors, stand
as a part of the Constitution?
- 4th Shall proposition number Four respecting Claims against the
Commonwealth, stand as a part of the Constitution?
- 5th Shall proposition number Five respecting Imprisonment for Debt
stand as a part of the Constitution?
- 6th Shall proposition number Six respecting Sectarian Schools, stand
as a part of the Constitution?
- 7th Shall proposition number Seven respecting the Creation of Corpora-
tions, stand as a part of the Constitution?
- 8th Shall proposition number Eight respecting Formation of Banks
and requiring Security for Bank Bills, stand as a part of the Consti-
tution?

The votes upon the Constitutional propositions to be brought in on
one ballot and in sealed Envelopes.
