It was then voted the amount granted for schools be equally divided in the five School Districts that three hundred dollars be expended for Summer Schools the remainder for Winter Schools. Also Voted that if the sum granted for fuel should not be sufficient for Wood that the balance be taken out of the amount for Tuition and Board.

5. Voted that all Single Poll Taxes shall be payable on demand all other Taxes payable on demand after the first day of November next. The Collector to make his first payment to the Treasurer on the 20th. of November next. the second payment on the 20th. of December next, and the third and last payment on or before the first of February next each payment shall be made in full when due either by cash or note on demand with interest if not so paid the Collector shall forfeit his per centage for collecting. Elisha W. Haynes was Chosen Collector who agrees to Collect the Taxes for eightyfour cents on the hundred dollars. Voted to instruct the Treasurer to enforce the payment of Taxes now due.

6. Voted that the Town Hall be used for the same purposes and on the same conditions as last year. Voted to let out the taking care of the Town House to the lowest bidder the person having charge of said house to open the same at all times when ordered by the Selectmen warm and light the same when necessary and be present at all times when said House is occupied, sweep said house when necessary, and wash the same at least four times during the year, and keep the Doors and Blinds closed and fastened when the House is not occupied and keep the House in good order at all times, saw the Wood and put the same into the Wood Closets, and ring the Bell for Town Meetings. all damage done to the House or Furniture through the fault or neglect of the person
