Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Sudbury qualified to vote for Senators and Representatives in the General Court of Massachusetts to meet at the town hall in said town on Friday, the first day of May next, at one of the clock in the afternoon precisely. Pursuant to Resolves of the general Court of Massachusetts entitled Resolves relating to the proposed Amendments of the Constitution Approved by the Governor, the eighth day of April A.D. 1857, to bring in to the Select men their votes by ballot for or against the several Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of this Commonwealth submitted to the people for their Approval or rejection, by the Resolves aforesaid.

You are also required to notify the inhabitants of said town qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the above named time and place, then and there to act on the following Article, viz:

Article 1st To Choose a Moderator

Art 2nd To hear and act on all reports, and pass any votes relative to the same that the town may think proper

Art 3rd To see if the town will authorize and empower the Collector for 1857, to use any and all means of collecting the Tax committed to him to collect, which may now be lawfully used by town treasurers when acting as collector.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up an attested copy thereof at the town house, and at each of the public meeting houses in said town, seven days at least before the time appointed for holding said meeting
