bequeath unto said town of Sudbury, three acres of land on the northerly part of the Sudbury Tavern Estate adjoining the land of Howe Brown beginning at the Meeting house road and running with equal width, with Brown line to the Brook, for the purpose of erecting thereon a suitable building for a library and the further sum of twenty-five hundred dollars, for the erection of such building; and whatever portion of said land shall not be needed for the purposes of said library building, the said town of Sudbury shall have full power and authority to apply to any other town purposes, but without any power of alienation". Also voted that the Selectmen be a committee, authorized by the town to receive and receipt for the above bequest.

Art 11 Voted that the Town House be opened, warmed, lighted, and taken care of, free, for Town meetings, all meetings of Town Officers, and Committees doing business for the town, all free lectures on the subject of education, and all political Caucuses. — And for all other purposes for which the (inhabitants of the town) shall use said house when an admission fee is not taken. The person or persons using said house, shall pay such sum of money as will be equal to the expense of lighting warming and taking care of the same while it is so used. And in all other cases, not mentioned above, the person or persons using the house shall pay a reasonable fee for the use of the house, in addition to the expense of lighting warming and taking care of the same. Then Voted to let out the taking care of the Town House to the lowest bidder on the following conditions: The person taking care of the house, shall open, warm, light, sweep, and wash the house when necessary, be present at all times when the house is
