

meeting before referred to, and the result of the vote was fifty-eight in the affirmative, none in the negative.

Then on motion of Joseph Smith the same vote was tried again, with the proviso that money should be paid to Snelling men only, or actual residents of the town at the time of enlistment. - the result was, sixty-one in the affirmative, - none in the negative.

Then the town voted that the report be recommitted, with instructions to the committee, to ascertain the number and names of all the soldiers who are entitled to pay according to the vote of the town passed April 29th 1861, provided the same could be legally paid, with the amount to which each is entitled, and to report the same to the town at some future meeting.

Apr 14 Voted that the Selectmen be a committee to examine the sluice south of the common and take such action relative to the same as they shall think for the interest of the town.

Apr 15 Voted to grant the free use of the Town Hall to the "Soldiers' aid Society", and cause it to be opened, warmed and lighted whenever they shall desire it.

Voted also to pay to the person having care of the Hall, the sum of seventy-five cents for each time he opens it for the above purpose.

Apr 16 Voted to instruct the Overseers of the Poor to hire a Warden for the Poor Farm previous to the first of March if they shall think it for the interest of the town so to do.

Apr 17 Report of the Overseers of the Poor relative to the building of a Granary on the Poor Farm, was read, accepted, and ordered to be recorded as follows. 9-17
