

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sudbury
 Your Committee chosen Jan 23^d 1871, to
 depose the incorporating of any portion of
 the Territory of the Town of Sudbury into
 a new Town. Report as follows:

Previous to any hearing before the Committee
 of the Legislature on the petition of Henry
 Fowler & others, for an act incorporating the
 Town of Maynard, certain propositions
 were made by the petitioners, as terms of
 separation and settlement, between the
 Town of Sudbury and the proposed new
 town. These propositions were laid before
 the town of Sudbury at a meeting called
 for that purpose on the 20th day of February
 1871, and your committee were given dis-
 cretionary power, provided we should
 accept of no terms less advantageous to the
 town of Sudbury than those contained
 in the agreement.

By mutual consent a bill was agreed upon
 and passed by the Legislature by which the town
 of Maynard was incorporated, for full par-
 ticulars in regard to which the town is refer-
 red to Chap. 198 of the Acts of 1871.

Subsequently your committee were authorized
 to settle with the authorities of the town of
 Maynard, according to the provisions of
 their charter.

We have attended to that duty and fur-
 ther report that the proportion of the town
 debt together with the money to be paid by the
 town of Maynard to the town of Sudbury for
 Maynard's share of the stock in the "Fram-
 ingham and Lowell Railroad Corporation
 owned by the town of Sudbury, with interest
 on the same amounted to \$20,883.28 which
 sum was paid by them to the Treasurer of the
 town of Sudbury on the 6th day of October 1871.

We have also attended to making a survey
 and establishing a line between said towns and
 have erected a large stone monument at the
