

Edmond Goodnow bought of Thomas Jlyn a parcel of meadow
lying in the great Aude meadow containing by estimation one
acre or there abouts to the said meadow or less lying between
the meadows of John Haynes and John Lott with all or part
of the commonage belonging to the said.

Granted to Robert Darvill four acres & a half of upland to the
said meadow or less lying between the Lott granted to John
Lott & the high way that leadeth towards the land of Mr
William H. Ham.

Also one acre & a half of upland parted from the Lott of the
said Robert Darvill by the high way & lies between the land of
the said John Maynard and the town ground.

Also sixpence acres of upland lying on the west side of the
river & outward running to the land of John Blaudford.

February the 28th 1643. It is agreed between Thomas Goodnow
and William Ward, that whereas the said Thomas hath a parcel
of meadow containing four acres or there abouts lying in the great
Aude meadow between the meadows of Andrew Wolsey & the
William Ward, And the said William Ward hath a parcel of meadow
containing by estimation five acres or there abouts lying in the great
Aude meadow between the meadows formerly granted to William
of John Lott. They the said Thomas & William by a coynt consent
have exchanged each with other that is to say, that the said Thomas
shall for ever enjoy the said five acres formerly belonging to the said
William Ward And the said William Ward shall for ever enjoy the
four acres formerly belonging to the said Thomas Goodnow.

The land granted by the Hon^{ble} Sherriff to Mr Thomas Walgrave
consisteth of upland lying between the little pond & the common
ground being bounded with a white oak at the high way that leadeth
from the Lott first granted to Thomas the Master of the
house run westward on a straight line along by the stream to
a little white oak against the high way & from thence over the stream
on a straight line southward to a little spring next to the stream of
the great pond, And from thence eastward on a straight line to a
stone that stands by the high way that leadeth from the Lott to
John the Master of the house & from thence northward to the white oak
marked by the Master of the house of land told in a little parcel
of meadow & part of the house swamp with in it
Also twenty five acres of meadow lying on the east side of
the river in the great Aude meadow & adjacent to the meadow
of William Haynes southward And Northward adjacent to the
meadow now in the possession of John Meant.
