

At a town meeting the 11th of October 1659
granted liberly to John moors the day and years above
written to take up eight acres of land where he
can conveniently in the west side of the river in
lands not yet disposed or layd out to any in law
and consideration of the six acres he layd down
for the benefit of the way to the west meadows
and to the new mill

Also granted liberly to Lieutenant Goodnow to take
up six acres of upland any where in the west side
of the river in any lands not all ready disposed
in law of the six acres where the town side
of him to make a way to the west meadow and
the new mill in building

January 7th 1659

Granted unto Mr Thomas Noyes & to Mr Peter Noyes
for & in consideration of building a mill at Hop Brook
lying & being on the west side of Sudbury great
meadow below the Cart way that leads to Redg meadow
viz fifty acres of upland & fifteen acres of meadow
without remaining to the said meadow house lands of
the said fifteen acres of meadow lying & being within
the divided tract of upland above granted to the
above named parties. Whereof of any of Sudbury
common land to build & maintain the said mill
with the town for the horse going considerations to build
a sufficient mill to grind the Towns corn by the
said mill to be built below the Cart way of now is leading
to Redg meadow the said granters they & theirs as
to have nothing to do with the stream a house for
the mill to be made the forementioned cart way of said
first of Dorchester next ensuing & if the said granters
they & theirs or assigns shall damage the high way over
the Brook by building the said mill they are to make the way
as good as now it is from time to time it is to say the
above specified way under the mill Brook of said Thom
Noyes & Peter are also to leave a high way six foot
wide running to the Brook from the Cart way that
now is to go to the Lookers meadow
