

July 1st second - 1666

Laid out unto Eliah Hoys the day and year above written the four  
arres of meadow formerly granted him conditionally at amurdon called as  
known by the name of long meadow near adyphingd unto the western  
line of our first line miles grant the meadow being twenty rods wide  
at the west end and is bounded by the upland on the west and also  
bounded on the south by the upland and a creek of common meadow  
running fourty rods. also bounded on the east end by a piece of common  
meadow and also bounded on the north by a piece of common meadow  
and the upland, the northwest corner being a fatall walnut the fourty  
corner being a white oak marked the fourty east corner is a stake  
by a great bush of alders. this laid out unto elia hoys by Edmund  
goodenow and Thomas noys the day and year above written

July 1st second 1666

Laid out unto James Top the day and year above written two  
arres of meadow at the north end of strabery hill meadow being in good  
small parcels and are bounded on the south and granted from strabery  
hill meadow by two works of upland meeting together and also bounded  
on the east and west by the common upland also bounded  
at the northeast end by two white oaks marked, the extremity  
of James Top is northeastly bounds crossing the meadow at the  
broadest place of the northmost meadow Edmund Goodenow and  
Thomas noys forsooke. this above sayd meadow was laid out  
to James Top in lieu of what meadow he laid down at or  
near the above former meadows

July 2d - 1664

Laid out unto the widow Peter four arres of meadow at the four  
end of strabery hill meadow being bounded fourty rods west and east  
by the common upland of Gurbury also bounded north by  
two marked trees this meadow was laid out unto the widow  
Peter in lieu of either an arres of upland where on more the  
making your stands and when he should or should of the lands  
some of age and make assurance of the lands to the Town  
of Gurbury, (the Town desire it) but the Town will  
further assure the sayd four arres of meadow unto the widow  
or her heirs in the mean time the widow and her heirs  
may make use of the sayd meadow
