

At a generall town meeting the 15th of february 1663
 Liffenant Goodenow Thomas moys / Liffenant whall forgent Groat m^e Lofey moys
 being first and forgent Groat were chosen for the year in going to order
 the generall affairs of the town of Sudbury also John Collis chosen constable
 for the year ensuing also Liffenant Goodenow Thomas moys and forgent Groat
 are chosen Comitioners for the year ensuing to and to determine small causes
 in Sudbury under forty shillings according unto law. also forgent Groat and
 Thomas moys are chosen to take and receive this present february for the
 rates and Town rate also forgent Groat as chosen Town men shall
 for his following years to receive the town rates and with the said Groat to
 pay the town of Sudbury debts and to have twenty shillings out of the
 present rate for his labour and charges.

Also granted liberty the day and years above written unto William Clarke to fell and
 cut timber on the common land in Sudbury to build him on ground on the land of the
 purchase of forgent woods.

Also Liffenant Goodenow forgent Groat m^e Lofey moys or either two
 of them are appointed a committee upon the desire of Thomas Goble
 and Daniell Deane to see and make return to the town whether or no
 the Country road betwix Sudbury and Concord may be altered without
 much damage to the towns the said Thomas Goble and Daniell Deane agreeing
 then the said Comitty for their charges.

Also voted the day and years above written that m^e Groat shall have fifty
 shillings for this years rent and also voted that there shall be four
 pounds added unto this present rate for the use of Thomas Liffenant
 for his and to pay for maintenance of him the said Thomas Liffenant
 also voted that agreed with the town of Sudbury pay all his former rates
 upon m^e Groat's land that he been levied only the broke land not to be
 rated this next rate and so the said Groat shall to pay four shillings to
 the town rate for the land this present rate.

Also agreed with John Dutton the day and years above written to mend and
 repair the ground his present charge according to the advice of
 Liffenant Goodenow and m^e Lofey moys and the said John
 Dutton to have for his labour fifteen according unto the judgment
 of the said Liffenant Goodenow and m^e Lofey moys out of his present rate.

6th of June 1664 at a town meeting in Sudbury the day and years above
 written granted liberty unto Liffenant Edmund Goodenow to take up by right
 and of land he bought of m^e William Brown in the highway all along
 betwix his own land and meadow at the west meadow by the middle bridge
 Also granted to Thomas Groat at Langham three quarters of an acre of
 land be it more or less as now it is layd by Liffenant Goodenow.
 forgent Groat and Thomas moys the said land being bounded on the
 south by a meadow by the highway and a whit oak for the double
 and from the said whit oak being the angle unto two small
 red oaks in a line unto his house on the north side of his house
 the said Groat not to sell nor cut down the said trees
 by any means also the said road paying for his expenses on the land
 before it was granted and for the purchase of the land twenty shillings
 money unto the above said Thomas moys within three days
 of his date June 1664
