Built

it a town meeting the day and year above written lieutenant goodenow
a surveyor to survey the lands in Sudbury viz Henry, wife and Thomas noyes
and either two of them may measure lands in Sudbury lawfully granted
and good like as he old pounds was in all respects except it was now
only ten foot longer and ten foot broader and set it in the
north east side of the old pound where adjoining unto it the
posts of the said pound are to be a foot square of good whit oak well
hewed the rails to be substantiall and good the workes of the post for
the rails to be made in the middle of the posts the way to be
spined with the pins, lieutenant Goodenow forgot Groat and Thomas
noyes are appointed attorney to let out his pound to building unto
any or any other man or men whom they can agree withall
and to pay and satisfy the said man or men with lands or ending unto
their best judgment and discretion
lieutenant Goodenow forgot Groat and Thomas noyes are and
appointed attorney to bound and stake the two pieces of meadow in the
great meadow viz one formerly layd out for amiasforth or also to find
out and advise the bounds of the twenty five acres of meadow in the gully
viz in the brown the pastor layd down unto the use of the town
of Sudbury four acres only of the said twenty five being
formerly layd out unto an other noyes the town paying him for
his paper. December 16 - 1664 at a town meeting the day and year
above written the town of Sudbury agreed the return of the community before
appointed for the laying out of Thomas Plymton's land on the west side of
the great river namely forgot Groat lieutenant Goodenow Thomas noyes
and Thomas gains viz said community before appointed did lay out unto
the said Thomas Plymton mine or town acres of upland and meadow more
or less on the east side and on the south east angle of ten acres formerly
layd out unto him the said Thomas Plymton at a place called strabory
beginning at the north east angle of the said ten acres and from thence running
a straight line south west the side of meadow viz Thomas noyes layd down
from a high way unto a little red oak marked for armore bounds the said
town has bounding the high way and the lands of the said Thomas Plymton
and from the little red oak afore said unto a good red oak marked for armore
on the side and from the good red oak afore said a line unto a red oak
marked in John Blanford's line six acres of the said land was in lieu of
six acres of land owing the said Thomas Plymton layd down on the west side
of Sudbury river over against the little point being part of the division
of the river on the west side the other four acres being in full satisfaction
