throw the defaults of the Seraisers or owners of fences or neyther mind
ding thair duty and thair owne good and pease of Town as
duty binds for the beter prevention of future damage of this
nature, we doe order that every Seraiser of fences neglecting his
duty in yeewing, warning, owners of fences, and also causing the
said fences to be made sufficient according to lawe shal forfeit
twelve pence a rod for every insufficient rod of fence not according
to lawe Town orders: wick twelve pence to be taken for a fine shall
be paid one halfe to the informer of the selectmen and the other
halfe for the Towns use. The Selectmen agreed at the same time
meeting to goe throw vnte the hole Town and examina how children
and youth are educated in reding and catacismes and how they spend
thair time. At a meeting of the Towne the 4th of June 1692
vntes and agreed by generall consent of the that the rate of
the Towns pre portion to fourer and tenty thousand pounds
shold be made by the invice taken in August 1691.
